Editor's Chat

No volunteers for the post of Newsletter Editor yet, so you will have to put up with me for another month. Perhaps I can bore you into volunteering?

After what can only be described as one of the wettest winters on record (or is it the fact that I have moved to Lancashire?) we are now in the grip of a record high pressure. Have you been caught out sitting on top of a hill waiting for a breeze to pick up or have you actually committed any aviation yet?

I went out to Stags Fell last Monday. After the winter lay off I had forgotten most of what was second nature at the end of last season. My glider had been serviced and I had repacked my reserve, but where were my gloves, flying suit and thermal underwear. Batteries, sandwiches, flask, water? My computer packed up recently and I had lost all my favourite weather links so I had to find them all again.

Obviously I was late setting off. I walked all the way around to the south-east face and wasn't surprised to find myself alone apart from a few walkers. It was on, but light. I decided to do some ground handling. Leaving my glider bag and bits and pieces (including my radio) on the grass I pulled the glider above my head. The air felt buoyant so I launched. It was easily soarable and I immediately regretted leaving some of my kit on the deck. Attempts to land next to it were thwarted by the steep slopes above and below my take-off: each time I made an approach I rocketed skywards. So I just kept an eye on it.

After about half an hour of soaring, wave conditions set in. Negligible penetration without my speed bar. I climbed about 2,000' in a straight line towards Hawes, getting further and further from my kit. It was cold. I managed to lose height over the car park and top landed in some dead air. I walked over to collect my glider bag and was relieved to have all my gear together once again.

Wendy reported that the wind had veered round to the south-west and confirmed my experience that it had picked up. I managed to find a small lump to get my glider out of the wind shadow and re-launched on the south-west face. Again I was rewarded with strong lift. Another pilot arrived on site and I could see him first trying to launch and then struggling to stay up. I wished that I had my radio turned on so that I could reassure him: perhaps he was trying to call me? After a while he slope landed and I landed by the car park.

So, lessons from the first flight of the season. Get your gear together the night before. Leave more time than usual. Don't get separated from your kit. Keep your radio on. Oh, and did I mention the Lynx helicopter, the Tuccano that flew below me, the C130 Hercules and the RAF Tornados. Did I remember to NOTAM the site the night before? Er, not exactly.

Club Coaches

The BHPA has recently announced the introduction of a coach revalidation system. This requires all Club Coaches to have a declaration of support signed by the Club's Chief Coach (or Chairman) at membership renewal time. The FSC also recommends that coaches should re-attend the Coach Course at least every five years to ensure that nothing gets forgotten and that they are fully up-to-date with current thinking. (The course fee is reduced by £10 for re-attendees.)

At present the BHPA has some 700 licensed Coaches. It is quite certain that many of these are completely inactive – perhaps having consciously decided to take step back in our more litigious society. There is therefore also a box on the membership form for coaches to tick if they no longer wish to hold a Coach Licence.

All this may well change our list of club coaches, which will be reviewed and updated on the website and in future newsletters soon.
